Gateway to St Andrews

The University of St Andrews is committed to achieving a diverse and vibrant student community made up of the best and brightest students. We recognise that diversity comes not only through nationality, but also from a wide range of backgrounds, experience and educational paths.

Our Gateway programmes provide additional support throughout the first year of study, including pre-arrival and transitional support to ensure that you have the best possible start at Andrews, and go on to achieve your full potential.

Gateway to Arts

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Students on the Gateway to Arts programme enter the first year of undergraduate study with a specific Honours route in mind. You will study modules relevant for your chosen route.

Gateway to Science

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Students on the Gateway to Science programme enter the first year of undergraduate study with a specific Honours route in mind. You will study modules relevant for your chosen route.

Gateway to Medicine

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The Gateway to Medicine programme gives students who have completed S5 or S6 the opportunity to study for one year in the Faculty of Science at first-year undergraduate level. Students who successfully achieve all requirements of this programme will progress into the first year of our medical degree.

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Gateway to Arts and Science programmes

What are the Gateway to Arts and Science programmes?

The Gateway to Arts and Gateway to Science programmes offer first-year entry to a wide range of our honours programmes with additional pastoral and academic support.

Who can apply?

Typically, candidates for Gateway programmes are those who have narrowly missed our minimum entry requirements and meet some, if not all, of the contextual criteria below:

- live in Scotland in an area of deprivation as defined by the Scottish Government as SIMD20
- · attend a low progression school
- · are care experienced as defined by their local
- · are a registered young carer.

Applicants under serious consideration for this route will be required to attend an informal interview with a member of our Admissions team and a member of academic staff to discuss their application in more detail.

Structure and progression

Gateway to Arts or Science students can study a wide range of subjects in our in our Faculty of Arts or Faculty of Science*. Like students on other programmes, Gateway students will study up to three subjects in their first and second years. Information about the range of subjects is available online:

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Provided that students on the Gateway programme meet the academic requirements in their second year (just like every other student), they will progress into the third year of their chosen Honours degree route. Gateway students will be treated as any other first year student; they will attend the same classes and have a traditional first year experience, with the addition of extra support built into the programme.

*Some subjects require previous subject knowledge

Entry requirements

Minimum grades are BBBB at Higher which should include the standard Faculty entry requirements. This must include any subject-specific requirements for the degree you intend to study. These can be taken over more than one sitting or include a combination of Highers or Advanced Highers.

Applicants will be considered for a place on the Gateway to Arts or Gateway to Science programme if they have not obtained the required grades to study their chosen subject at St Andrews but we see that they have the potential to do well.

Individual applications are considered based on contextual admissions information as well as academic performance. These factors determine whether an offer will be made, and specifically what it will be.


Typical structure of the Gateway to Arts programme

This diagram shows an example of a student entering the Gateway to Science programme intending to move to Honours in Biology. This student chose to change their Honours degree and graduate with a Geography degree, however, they could have chosen to take one of the degree routes within Biology.



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^{*}As long as appropriate grades are achieved in all three subjects the options are: Single Honours in English, Film Studies or Social Anthropology or Joint Honours in English-Social Anthropology, Film Studies-Social Anthropology or as illustrated English-Social Anthropology.

Gateway to Medicine

What is the Gateway to Medicine programme?

The Gateway to Medicine is a one-year full-time programme taught at the University of St Andrews in the Faculty of Science with contributions from staff in the Faculty of Medicine. Pupils can apply at the end of S5 or S6 if they narrowly missed out on the grades required to study Medicine. Those applying at the end of S5 will study on the Gateway to Medicine as an alternative to S6 in school.

Who can apply?

To be eligible for the Gateway to Medicine programme, an applicant must:

- · Reside in Scotland
- Have just completed S5 or S6 at a Scottish school
- Be eligible for their tuition fees to be paid by SAAS
- Not have met, or are predicted not to meet, the minimum entry requirements for our medicine programmes at the University of St Andrews.

Applicants should also meet one of the following criteria:

- have engaged with a Reach project
- reside in an area of socio-economic disadvantage are being looked after (or have been looked after) as a result of a local authority order
- · are a registered carer
- attend a school which has a low number of pupils who progress to higher education
- attend a school which has low attainment in relation to Highers and Advanced Highers.

Structure and progression

Gateway to Medicine students will study first-year modules in Biology and Chemistry plus one other module alongside other undergraduate students.

At the end of this year to progress to the full medical programme, students must have:

- passed all first year modules at grades specified at time of entry to the Gateway to Medicine programme
- achieved a suitable UCAT score
- achieved a pass in the Multiple Mini Interview (MMI).

Entry requirements

The entry requirements are as follows:

- BBBB in Scottish Highers which must include Chemistry and one other of Biology, Mathematics or Physics. These must be obtained in one sitting in S5.
- If Biology, English and Mathematics have not been passed at Higher each must have been passed at National 5 grade B.
- For S6 entry, BBBB at Higher in S5 and CC in S6 subjects at Higher or Advanced Higher.

If all modules are passed but not at the grades specified at the time of entry, students can remain in the Faculty of Science with the opportunity to transfer to a BSc Honours programme where pre-requisites have been met.









Additional support

There is a variety of support in place for students on our Gateway to Medicine programme:

- a designated support person from the Admissions team
- a designated Adviser of Studies
- · support in preparing for the UCAT and MMI
- additional support modules which include tutoring in Biology and Chemistry as well as Medicine-specific content to help prepare for the transition to the first year of our medical degree.

Scholarships and funding

Scholarships for the Gateway to Medicine programme are available as well as the opportunity to apply for further support upon entry to a named degree programme.
